8th GRADE SOCIAL STUDIES

8TH GRADERS ONLY

Eighth grade history is an American history survey course guiding students chronologically through the history of the United States while highlighting key events, people, and places from a Christian perspective. This class will give students the opportunity to learn, grow and utilize note-taking and paragraph summarizing skills.

There will be weekly reading and writing activities assigned from the daily lessons. Students will complete map work in class on a weekly basis. Assessment will be completed quarterly through 2 mini-projects throughout and a research presentation at the end of each quarter. Students will keep a Presidential Biography catalog which will be added to weekly and submitted at the end of each semester.

AMERICAN SIGN LANGUAGE

7th and 8th Grade Elective

This is an introduction to American Sign Language (ASL) for students with little or no previous knowledge of ASL.

7th & 8th grade students will learn basic conversation, vocabulary, fingerspelling, visual receptive and gestural expressive skills, and cultural information related to the deaf community through classroom activities and games.

8th Grade ASL will build upon previous skills learned in the 7th grade class and will follow the same format as the 7th grade class.

Voices Off

Students will participate extensively in interactive classroom activities using the "voices off" policy for two major reasons: learning environment and cultural respect. ASL students are not just learning this language; but also learning the culture. Full immersion helps develop better receptive and expressive skills. Using voice may distract or interfere with other students' learning process. Students must also focus in class by using eyes to "hear". This is very important!

ART

7th and 8th Grade (separate classes)

In this class we will explore the basics of the creative process, strengthening our observation skills and idea generation muscles. We will be building our visual literacy, drawing inspiration from art history and the world around us. This class will primarily work in pencil, pen, marker, colored pencil, watercolor, and occasionally acrylic paint as time allows. There will be a weekly sketchbook assignment. The students will be graded on participation. They will need to use their time and materials responsibly in class, complete sketchbook work to be successful in this class. We will spend time in class learning how to evaluate and appreciate each finished project together, but the grade given will reflect effort, willingness to follow directions, and craftsmanship. This class is one day a week.

BIBLICAL WORLDVIEW

7th and 8th Grade Students

Middle School Worldview uses Walking in Truth Grade 8 by Summit Ministries. The curriculum is divided into two sections. The first section covers worldview topics while the second section covers the Epistles in depth. We will be studying the Epistles the entire year, using the second half of the curriculum only.

Topics covered are Paul's counsel to the churches, superiority of Christ, faith lived out, humility, hope, worship, and sacrifice.

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WORLD GEOGRAPHY

1.0 Credit M/W both semesters

World Geography is a one-year high school course that describes and explains the world God created. Students will learn about mankind's interaction with the world both in the past and in the present. The curriculum addresses two main questions: How has the physical world made a difference in what people have done, how they have lived, and how they live today? How have people made a difference in the physical world, and how are they making a difference in it today?

Your high school student will gain a rich understanding of physical and human geography through reading the narrative lessons, studying the maps and completing map assignments, completing writing assignments and hands-on projects, and gaining a Biblical perspective on world religions and culture.

There will be weekly reading, note taking, and questions assigned.

Expect 2-3 hours of work outside of class per week.

.5 Credit W both semesters

The ability to communicate effectively with others is essential in not only almost every career field, but in human relationships in general. Learning good speaking skills will allow students the confidence needed to relate to and communicate with their coworkers, their peers, and others in their communities/churches as they grow closer to adulthood. This course will teach students how to apply healthy and effective communication principles and practices to speaking before audiences, in small groups, and in conversations with others with both verbal and nonverbal skills. Students will learn how to write and present engaging speeches of various lengths and on various topics throughout the course.

WRITING

1.0 Credit M/W all year

Writing invites students into a year of observation, analysis and practice of the written word. Students will write in various genres, including poetry, narrative, argument, and informational. Students will also read a vast array of mentor texts to gain skill in noticing and mimicking the craft moves of professional writers. Because readers are the strongest writers, this class will also emphasize reading.

SCIENCE

BIOLOGY

RECOMMENDED FOR 10TH GRADERS 1.0 Credit M/W both semesters

This college-prep biology course provides students with a thorough understanding of the relevance of scientific inquiry. After completing this course, students will be able to understand the vocabulary of biology and gain a strong understanding of the scientific method that will equip them to analyze data across other disciplines.

Modules cover atoms, chemical structures, ecosystems, biomes, ecological communities, cell structure and function, cellular energy, DNA, proteins, cell cycles, and genetics (including inheritance, disorders, and technology). Students will also learn about prokaryotes, viruses, protists, fungi, and the fascinating worlds of plants and animals.

AMERICAN SIGN LANGUAGE I

1.0 Credit M/W both semesters

ASL 1 is an introduction to American Sign Language (ASL). Regardless of grade or previous ASL experience, all high school students will begin at this level.

ASL 1 is an important foundational class where students will learn basic conversation, basic grammar, vocabulary, fingerspelling, and expression and receptive skills through classroom activities and games to apply what they've learned! Students will learn about Deaf Culture and Deaf History.

Voices Off

Students will participate in classroom activities using the "voices off" policy for two reasons: learning environment and cultural respect. ASL students are not just learning the language; but also learning the culture. Full immersion helps develop better receptive and expressive skills. Using voice may distract or interfere with other students' learning process. Students must also focus in class by using eyes to "hear". This is very important!

Assessment

We will periodically evaluate students' Expressive and Comprehension Skills through quizzes, written tests, and self-assessments. To take the next level ASL class a teacher must approve that enrollment.

AMERICAN SIGN LANGUAGE II

1.0 Credit M/W both semesters

ASL 2 is a continuation of American Sign Language 1 and emphasizes the continuing development and reinforcement of expressive signing skills, receptive signing skills, and knowledge of Deaf culture. ASL 1 is a prerequisite for this class. A teacher must approve of enrollment.

Student Responsibilities

Required to do ASL presentations in class, academic research, and record themselves for some assignments or small projects. Must attend one deaf event to interact with the deaf community and demonstrate skills learned

Voices Off

Students will participate in interactive classroom activities using the "voices off" policy for two major reasons: learning environment and cultural respect. ASL students are not just learning this language; but also learning the culture. Full immersion helps develop better receptive and expressive skills. Using voice may distract or interfere with other students' learning process. Students must also focus in class by using eyes to "hear". This is very important!

Assessment

AMERICAN SIGN LANGUAGE III

1.0 Credit M/W both semesters

ASL 3 is an advanced level for students who have demonstrated exceptional ability and interest in the study of ASL and who seek more challenging linguistic exploration into the language. ASL 2 is a prerequisite for this class. A teacher must approve of enrollment.

Students will learn creative usage of ASL in the form of poetry, hymn, storytelling, Bible story, and Bible verses as introduced by teachers and other signers via videos.

Deaf Cultural topics are included in each quarter to expand cultural perspectives and understanding. Students will participate in interactive classroom activities using the "Voice Off" policy to ensure ASL immersion.

Student Responsibilities

- Must attend two deaf events to interact with the deaf community and demonstrate skills learned

Assessment

1.0 Credit M 2-hour block both semesters

ELEMENTS OF DESIGN
